in 1968 we celebrated the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the birth of karl marx we still have reason to hope for a concrete celebration in 2018 with a demonstrably thorough grasp of marxist thought and seemingly effortless literary flair ernst bloch provides both the well versed reader and the novice a truly enjoyable introduction to one of the most influential thinkers in history

we all get angry at the built in frustrations and humiliations of everyday life but few of us ever experience the intense and perverse hatred that inspires acts of malignant violence such as suicide bombings or ethnic massacres in hatred dr willard gaylin one of america s most respected psychiatrists describes how raw personal passions are transformed into acts of violence and cultures of hatred such hatred goes beyond mere emotion hatred gaylin explains is a psychological disorder a form of quasi delusional thinking it requires forming a passionate attachment an obsessive involvement with the scapegoat population it is designed to allow the angry and frustrated individual to disavow responsibility for his own failures and misery by directing it towards a convenient victim gaylin dissects the mechanisms by which cynical political and religious leaders manipulate frustrated and deprived people leading to the acts of mass terror that threaten us all step by step he leads us into an understanding of the psychological pathway to acts of terrorism an understanding that is an essential to survival in a

world of hatred hatred is a masterwork in willard gaylin s life long study of human emotions writing for the educated lay audience in the eloquent accessible language of his bestsellers feelings and rediscovering love he takes us to the very roots of hatred

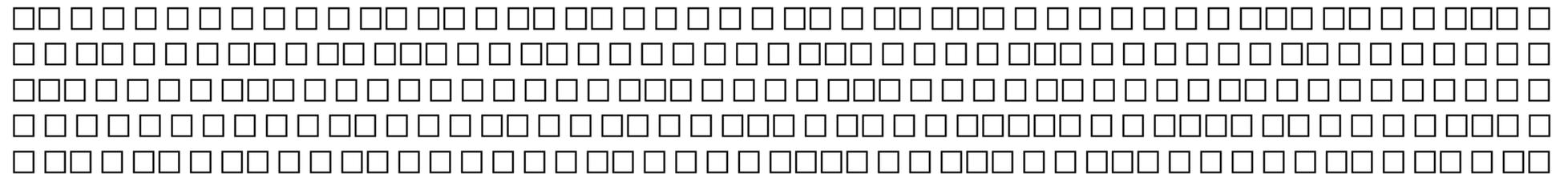

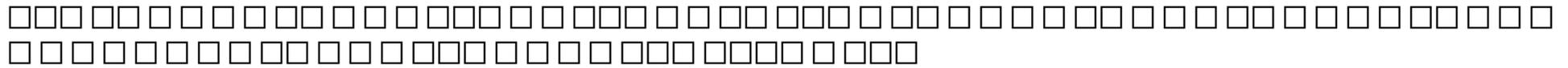

in his book losing the hate simon palmer has combined his mastery of storytelling with a raw hard look at the issues one faces as a result of child sexual abuse it is an honest attempt to shed light on the darkest of subject matters simon has offered up his experiences in bone chilling detail giving the reader a first hand account of his journey from innocence to depravity his downward spiral is both shocking and heart wrenching but most of all it is honest losing the hate has been rightfully described as jaw dropping it is brutally raw and yet despite the atrocious circumstances the author manages to mesmerize his readers with a delicate hand and a bountifully open heart in simon s own words i have lived within this dark cloud for most of my life with many complex issues still unresolved there is a feeling of complete and utter loneliness within me and in desperation to rid my world of darkness i have chosen to put my story into words telling the world of my nightmare

look closely at any day and we can usually find anger in both our actions and attitudes things spill or go missing we get stuck in traffic and the people we live and work with often make life even harder we want to stay calm but what do you do when you feel your blood pressure rise yet again anger is so commonyet it also destroys it leaves its mark on usits not healthy which is one reason we hear so much about finding peace and it leaves its mark on others the wounds we inflict on others when we are angrythe loss of intimacy trust security and enjoyment in our closest relationships give us compelling reasons to look closely at our anger and think carefully about how to grow in patience and peace if you have just gotten irritated for the umpteenth time today you might wonder if change is possible can anyone grow in patience and peace yes but you need a plan biblical counselor and psychologist ed welch invites readers to take a 50 day journey that unpacks anger and encourages readers to become more skillful at responding with patience to lifes difficulties along the way readers will be introduced to jesus the prince of peacethe only one who can empower his people to grow in patience peace and wholeness

this book takes the reader on a philosophical quest to understand the dark side of emotions the chapters are devoted to the analysis of negative emotions and are organized in a historical manner spanning the period from ancient greece to the present time each chapter addresses analytical questions about specific emotions generally considered to be unfavorable and classified as negative the general aim of the volume is to describe the polymorphous and context sensitive nature of negative emotions as well as changes in the ways people have interpreted these emotions across different epochs the editors speak of the dark side of the emotions because their goal is to capture the ambivalent unstable and shadowy aspects of emotions a number of studies have taken the categorial distinction between positive and negative emotions for granted suggesting that negative emotions are especially significant for our psychological experience because they signal difficult situations for this reason the editors stress the importance of raising analytical questions about the valence of particular emotions and focussing on the features that make these emotions ambivalent how despite their negativity such emotions may turn out to be positive this opens up a perspective in which each emotion can be understood as a complex interlacing of negative and positive properties the collection presents a thoughtful dialogue between philosophy and contemporary scientific research it offers the reader insight by illuminating the dark side of the emotions

an informal yet rigorous exploration of human emotions in all their complexity and subtlety why do we cry at the movies what is the best way to manage destructive feelings such as jealousy although emotions pervade our lives their nature causes and effects have only recently been studied by social scientists and philosophers despite growing scientific interest in the subject empirical findings have not yet caught up with our intuitive knowledge in this book aaron ben ze ev carries out what he calls a careful search for general patterns in the primeval jungle of emotions in an engaging informal style he draws on a variety of theoretical approaches and popular sources to produce a coherent account of emotions in all their subtlety all of the ideas are illustrated with examples drawn from everyday life the book is organized into two parts the first presents an overall conceptual framework for understanding emotions it looks at the typical characteristics and components of emotions distinguishes emotions from other affective phenomena classifies the emotions and covers such related issues as emotional

intelligence regulating emotions and emotions and morality the second part discusses individual emotions including envy jealousy pleasure in others misfortune pity compassion anger hate disgust love sexual desire happiness sadness pride regret and shame the text is laced with insightful and often amusing quotations from sources ranging from mae west to montesquieu

lisa tessman s *burdened virtues* is a deeply original and provocative work that engages questions central to feminist theory and practice from the perspective of aristotelian ethics focused primarily on selves who endure and resist oppression she addresses the ways in which devastating conditions confronted by these selves both limit and burden their moral goodness and affect their possibilities of flourishing she describes two different forms of moral trouble prevalent under oppression the first is that the oppressed self may be morally damaged prevented from developing or exercising some of the virtues the second is that the very conditions of oppression require the oppressed to develop a set of virtues that carry a moral cost to those who practice them traits that tessman refers to as *burdened virtues* these virtues have the unusual feature of being disjoined from their bearer s own well being tessman s work focuses on issues that have been missed by many feminist moral theories and her use of the virtue ethics framework brings feminist concerns more closely into contact with mainstream ethical theory this book will appeal to feminist theorists in philosophy and women s studies but also more broadly ethicists and social theorists

uses simple buddhist principles an easily understandable way this book may help readers replace the anger in their lives with a newfound contentment

this book seeks to identify the motivations of individual perpetrators of ethnic violence the work develops four models labeled fear hatred resentment and rage gleaned from existing social science literatures the empirical chapters apply these four models to important events of ethnic conflict in eastern europe from the 1905 russian revolution to the collapse of yugoslavia in the 1990 s each historical chapter generates questions about the timing and target of ethnic violence the four models are then applied to the case to learn which does the best job in explaining the observed patterns of ethnic conflict

eugene h peterson speaks to christians who realize the necessity for prayer and yearn for it but who find their prayer unconvincing and unsatisfying addressing the causes of this dissatisfaction answering god offers guidelines for using the psalms as dynamic tools for prayer

four faces of anger brings to the modern age wisdom on the topic of anger by four ancient authors these authors are broadly representative of the classic views on anger in the tradition seneca the first century a d stoic philosopher whose moral teaching won the admiration of pagans and christians alike even that of the irascible jerome evagrius who represents the monastic anchoretic tradition of the desert and its emphasis on the spiritual growth of the individual cassian who trained in the same desert shaped this tradition to speak to cenobites in the west our last author augustine treats of the subject both as monastic legislator for his monks and as bishop for his lay congregation his rule for monks has one whole chapter devoted to the topic of how to deal with anger in a community setting although his initial ideas expressed in abstractions and ideals are important foundations for communal living augustine goes on to teach that the genuine work of building a loving and unified community is realized in the concrete struggles of human nature striving to overcome the tendencies of individualism and egoism anger a force that often breaks down and prevents the growth of community must eventually be squarely faced and according to all of the monastic authors discussed in this book the sooner the better this chapter also includes several instances in augustine s own life when he had to deal with anger in himself in his congregation or in the wider world that often solicited his help the reader will soon realize that the christian authors are not much interested in what anger is from a psychological perspective though their treatment of anger is not entirely devoid of this element but their focus is rather on how the vice of anger inhibits the spiritual growth of the soul and its relationship with god everyone whether monastic or not will glean from these pages the essential elements of detecting eliminating and controlling the negative side of this emotion so that he or she will advance on the spiritual journey unshackled by this all too pervasive human passion

david hume is widely recognised as the greatest philosopher to have written in the english language his treatise on human nature is one of the most important works of moral philosophy ever written hume on morality introduces and assesses hume s life and the background of the treatise the ideas and text in the treatise hume s continuing importance to philosophy

in 2004 russia experienced its most appalling act of terrorism in history the 53 hour seizure of school no 1 in beslan north ossetia approximately 1 200 children parents and teachers were taken hostage and over 330 were killed hundreds more seriously wounded and all severely traumatized in after violence debra javeline analyzes the aftermath of this large scale violence with evidence from almost all direct

victims despite widespread predictions of retaliatory ethnic violence the massacre instead triggered unprecedented peaceful political activism after violence provides insights into this unexpected but favorable outcome

this is the extended and annotated edition including an extensive biographical annotation about the author and his life in any commentary on a portion of the old testament by a writer unacquainted with hebrew exact criticism and freedom from mistake must not be expected but the psalms have been so in the mouth and in the heart of god s people in all languages that it has been necessary often to find an explanation suitable to imperfect translations and no doubt it is intended that we should use such explanations for the purpose of edification when we are unable to be more accurate though in proving doctrine it is necessary always to remember and allow for any want of acquaintance with the original or uncertainty with respect to its actual meaning however the main scope and bearing of the text is rarely affected by such points as vary in different translations and the analogy of the faith is sufficient to prevent a catholic 4 mind from adopting any error in consequence of a text seeming to bear a heterodox meaning perhaps the errors of translation in the existing versions may have led the fathers to adopt rules of interpretation ranging too far from the simple and literal but having such translations they could hardly use them otherwise meanwhile st augustin will be found to excel in the intense apprehension of those great truths which pervade the whole of sacred writ and in the vivid and powerful exposition of what bears upon them it is hardly possible to read his practical and forcible applications of holy scripture without feeling those truths by the faith of which we ought to live brought home to the heart in a wonderful manner his was a mind that strove earnestly to solve the great problems of human life and after exhausting the resources and discovering the emptiness of erroneous systems found truth and rest at last in catholic christianity in the religion of the bible as expounded by st ambrose and though we must look to his confessions for the full view of all his cravings after real good and their ultimate satisfaction yet throughout his works we have the benefit of the earnestness with which he sought to feed on the sincere milk of the word
