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this second edition of this widely used text covers the last two centuries of indian history concluding with an epilogue written from the perspective of the 1990s it thematically and analytically discusses the emergence of india as one of the world s largest democracies and one of the most stable of the states to emerge from the experience of colonialism the foundations of this rare phenomenon in either asia or africa are seen in india s society the ideas and beliefs of her people and the institutions of government and politics which have developed on the subcontinent in a process of interaction between what was indigenous to india and the many external influences brought to bear on the country by economic political and ideological contact with the western world modern scholarship has shown how diverse and complex was india s socio economic and political development and this theme runs through the study which eschews any simple understanding of india s political development as a clash between imperialism and nationalism or the making of a new nation the complexity reflects many of the continuing ambiguities and inequalities in the subcontinent s life and suggests why the structures of the state and indeed the very nature of the indian nation are now being questioned often with unprecedented public violence india s dilemmas are not hers alone they also raise economic political and social issues of profound significance throughout the contemporary world

dr brown presents a political study of the first clearly defined period in mahatma gandhi s indian career from 1915 to 1922 the period began with gandhi s return from south africa as a stranger to indian politics witnessed his dramatic assertion of leadership in the indian national congress of 1920 and ended with his imprisonment by the british after the collapse of his all india civil disobedience movement against the raj focusing on gandhi this book nevertheless investigates the changing nature of indian politics it aims to study precisely what gandhi did on whom he relied for support how he interacted with other nationalist leaders and how he saw his own role in indian public life unlike the usual interpretation of gandhi s rise to power as based on a charismatic appeal to the indian masses this study argues that his influence depended on a capacity to generate a network of lesser leaders or subcontractors who would organise their constituencies for him whether these were caste communal or economic groups or whole areas

judith brown explores nehru as a figure of power and provides an assessment of his leadership at the head of a newly independent india with no tradition of democratic politics

examines the history of british worldwide expansion from the glorious revolution of 1689 to the end of the napoleonic wars a crucial phase in the creation of the modern british empire

mahatma gandhi s lengthy indian career was of central importance in the development of indian politics and the changing relationship of the british raj and its subjects but the extent of his political influence and his role varied considerably at different times this book is an analysis based on new material of the phase between 1928 and 1934 when gandhi was leader of a continental campaign of civil disobedience against the raj during this time gandhi emerged from the comparative political quiescence which had followed his initial rise to prominence in 1920 as architect of a campaign of non cooperation with the raj he resumed a crucial role as leader of the

congress movement against the british at the peak of his political influence he negotiated a pact with the viceroy by which the civil disobedience campaign most graphically illustrated in the famous salt march to dandi was suspended

this volume presents an original account of mahatma gandhi s four meanings of freedom as sovereign national independence as the political freedom of the individual as freedom from poverty and as the capacity for self rule or spiritual freedom in this volume seven leading gandhi scholars write on these four meanings engaging the reader in the ongoing debates in the east and the west and contributing to a new comparative political theory

gandhi s quit india movement of 1942 was the climax of a nationalist revolutionary movement which sought independence on india s own terms indian independence was attained through revolution not through a benevolent grant from the british imperial regime the british left india because indians had made it impossible for them to stay the bases for francis hutchins thesis are new facts from hitherto unused sources interviews with surviving participants in the movement private papers from the gandhi memorial museum and the nehru memorial museum and library documents in the national archives of india in particular he has studied the secret records of the british government recently made available which reveal for the first time the extent of the revolutionary movement and britain s plans for dealing with it of the british records hutchins says no other regime has left such careful documentation of its strategies or compiled such extensive records revealing the way in which it was overthrown even though england had always proclaimed its hope that india would one day become independent the tacit assumption was that this was a remote eventuality only after gandhi s quit

india movement did britain s political parties resign themselves to the necessity to leave quickly whether or not they believed india was ready obscured by censorship in india and by preoccupation with world war ii the significance of gandhi s revolutionary technique was not appreciated at the time hutchins impressive analysis uses the indian case to develop a general theory of the revolutionary nature of colonial nationalism

glamour is an alluring but elusive concept we most readily associate it with fashion industrial design and hollywood of the golden age and yet it also shaped the language and interests of high modernism in glamour in six dimensions judith brown looks at the historical and aesthetic roots of glamour in the early decades of the twentieth century arguing that glamour is the defining aesthetic of modernism in the clean lines of modernism she finds the ideal conditions for glamour blankness polish impenetrability and the suspicion of emptiness behind it all brown focuses on several cultural products that she argues helped to shape glamour s meanings the most significant perfume of the twentieth century chanel no 5 the idea of the jazz age and its ubiquitous cigarette the celebrity photograph the staging of primitivism and the invention of a shimmering plastic called cellophane alongside these artifacts she takes up the development refinement and analysis of glamour in anglo american poetry film fiction and drama of the period glamour in six dimensions thus asks its reader to see the proximity between the vernacular and elite cultures of modernism and particularly how glamour was animated by artists working at the crossroads of the mundane and the extraordinary wallace stevens f scott fitzgerald virginia woolf josephine baker d h lawrence gertrude stein nella larsen and others

or great soul while following him only a small part of the way to the social transformation he envisioned the man himself emerges as one of history's most remarkable self-creations a prosperous lawyer who became an ascetic in a loincloth wholly dedicated to political and social action lelyveld leads us step by step through the heroic and tragic last months of this selfless leader's long campaign when his nonviolent efforts culminated in the partition of india the creation of pakistan and a bloodbath of ethnic cleansing that ended only with his own assassination india and its politicians were ready to place gandhi on a pedestal as father of the nation but were less inclined to embrace his teachings muslim support crucial in his rise to leadership soon waned and the oppressed untouchables for whom gandhi spoke to hindus as a whole produced their own leaders here is a vital brilliant reconsideration of gandhi's extraordinary struggles on two continents of his fierce but finally unfulfilled hopes and of his ever evolving legacy which more than six decades after his death still ensures his place as india's social conscience and not just india's

as a child tom enjoys painting in the style of the renaissance artist fra angelico and grows up to become a benedictine monk named brother joseph with a gift for painting religious icons

from a renowned behavioural neuroscientist and recovering addict a rare page turning work of science that draws on personal insights to reveal how drugs work the dangerous hold they can take on the brain and the surprising way to combat today s epidemic of addiction judith grisel was a daily drug user and college dropout when she began to consider that her addiction might have a cure one that she herself could perhaps discover by studying the brain now after twenty five years as a neuroscientist she shares what she and other scientists have learned about addiction enriched by captivating glimpses of her personal journey in never enough grisel reveals the unfortunate bottom line of all regular drug use there is no such thing as a free lunch all drugs act on the brain in a way that diminishes their enjoyable effects and creates unpleasant ones with repeated use yet they have their appeal and grisel draws on anecdotes both comic and tragic from her own days of using as she learns the science behind the love of various drugs from marijuana to alcohol opiates to psychedelics speed to spice drug abuse has been called the most formidable health problem worldwide and grisel delves with compassion into the science of this scourge she points to what is different about the brains of addicts even before they first pick up a drink or drug highlights the changes that take place in the brain and behaviour as a result of chronic using and shares the surprising hidden gifts of personality that addiction can expose she describes what drove her to addiction what helped her recover and her belief that a cure for addiction will not be found in our individual brains but in the way we interact with our communities set apart by its colour candour and bell clear writing never enough is a revelatory look at the roles drugs play in all of our lives it offers crucial new insights into how we can solve the epidemic of abuse
